SYNOPSIS OF "THE MUSIC MAN"

"The Music Man" is set against the background of Meredith Willson's own native lowa. The time is 1912 — an era of barber-shop quartets, high button shoes, gaudy sleeve garters and the "traveling salesman." Harold Hill, our hero, is one such traveling man. He has quite a reputation among his fellow salesmen and also gains one in each town he visits. Harold has become a legend, and as one salesman puts it:

"He's just a bang beat bell-ringin' big haul, great go, neck-or nothin' rip-roarin', ever' time-a-bull's-eye salesman, that's Professor Harold Hill!"

Harold Hill is a captivatin con-man who sells entire bands to the youth of small towns. He starts first by selling the instruments, then by selling uniforms; before any of the townspeople realize that he has failed to teach anyone to play a single note, the professor has hopped the local freight for the next town and the next conquest.

When Harold arrives in River City, Iowa, his enthusiastic spell-binding pitch wins over the townspeople immediately. Orders for instruments and uniforms pile in rapidly. But he is more than a salesman of bands — he is also a salesman of fun, laughter and lightheartedness. River City changes from a dull little town into a gay singing community. His vitality pulls little Winthrop Paroo, still grieving over his father's death, back to the enjoyment of childhood. He captivates all the townspeople but two — lovely Marian, the librarian, who possesses the information to expose his as a fraud; and the town's mayor, whose pool hall is all but put out of business when Harold takes over the youngsters. Harold feels that he can handle the mayor until it is time to skip town — and as for Marian — well, no woman has ever before been able to resist his salesmanship...

Of course, with success comes enemies — since this is 1912, there must be a villain. Trouble comes to River City and Harold Hill in the form of a jealous traveling salesman armed with all the proof he needs to ruin our lovable rogue. Harold soon realizes he'll have to reach deep into his bag of tricks if he is to avoid an unpleasant "tar-and-feather party." And being 1912, of course, the villain can't be successful.
